All smoke alarms should be tested at least once a month using the test button.

For People who are Deaf or Hard Of Hearing

What is your plan for protecting those that are deaf or hard of hearing in your response district?

There are a lot of smoke alarm options for people with a hearing disability. However, the fire service often overlooks these alarms when ordering smoke detectors.

The alarms that are available often use strobe lights and vibration notification. The vibration systems can be inserted into pillows or beds to alert the individual during nighttime hours. This equipment is activated by the sound of a standard smoke alarm.

In addition, for the hard of hearing, there are smoke alarms that emit a loud mixed, low pitch sound. These devices have been proven to work better for the elderly.

It is essential that a recognized testing laboratory approve all devices. This is needed for both the protection of the individual and for fire department liability concerns.
